Dear Parents and Carers

It doesn't seem possible to believe that we have come to the end of summer 2 already! The weather has been so kind to us that we have been able to make the most of the beautiful school grounds for lunchbreaks and today that will culminate in a celebration picnic for the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth 11.

The children will all be bringing home a special Jubilee gift as a memento of this joyful occasion.

When the children return to school on 6th June, we will be going back to our pre-COVID entry and exit route – which will be the pedestrian gate currently used by Year 5 and 6, for all pupils. This will ensure a higher level of safety for everyone as we have had some worries about children using the vehicle entrance lately. All children will come in via the pedestrian gate and scooters, bikes etc in by the large gate next to it. The children will then be able to use the internal path round the front of the building and will not have to cross the car park. To ensure that everyone remembers we will close the vehicle access gate at entry and exit times for children.

Please be aware that the zig-zag lines at the front of the school entrances are “No-Stopping” areas and anyone caught dropping children from a vehicle stopped on these lines is liable to a fine from the Police and points on their licence. We wouldn't want anyone to have to deal with this and we need to keep our children safe so please only use the indicated lay-by areas to drop or collect your children. Thank you for your cooperation.


We are currently in the process of redecorating the new library in preparation for the shelving and books to arrive in June; Scott the caretaker is working hard to get it all ready in time.



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
LEARNING AND CURRICULUM NEWS

Class Learning Blog – Yrs 5/6 French Trip

On Monday, 16th May, 40 pupils from Year 5 and Year 6 travelled to Chailland, Brittany, France, for an action-packed, cultural-filled, 5-day residential visit. Here are just some of the highlights from our trip.



On the first day the children travelled almost 1,000km, including travelling under the English Channel via Eurotunnel, to get to their destination, Chateau Beaumont. On arrival the children excitedly got into their dorms, before being given a tour of their site and feasting on their dinner, Spaghetti Bolognese with French chocolate éclairs for dessert. Afterwards there was still time for an egg dropping competition, with all groups competing to design packaging to prevent their egg from cracking when dropped from the top of the Chateau.


On their second, and scorching-hot, day at the Chateau, the children woke to devour a huge continental breakfast before jumping on board the coach to travel to Fougeres, a city in Brittany, to visit their amazing castle, one of the best examples of a medieval castle in France. After a guided tour, we boarded the bus to visit the Monbana chocolate boutique shop, where the children sampled and purchased copious amounts of chocolate before returning back to the Chateau, where they enjoyed eating a picnic lunch with a local French school, which gave children a great opportunity to practice meeting and greeting using another language. Following this, the children spent the afternoon engaged in climbing, archery and fun Olympic games. We ended our day with a fun 'Music in Movies' quiz.



On our third day, we were up and away at 9 a.m. travelling to St. Hellier's Market, a location frequently seen in Channel 4's Escape to the Chateau. Whilst there, the children were given the independence to go off with their friends and spend some of their euros, which they have been itching to do since we arrived. One rule... you are not allowed to buy anything living (see the photographs). After 90 minutes, the children returned with a variety of caps, bandanas, watches, bouncy balls and other oddities.

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After this, it was back in the coach to the coast, where we visited one of the world's man-made wonders, Mont St. Michel, a Christian commune, situated on a small island, only accessible during low tide. Whilst there, we took in the beautiful village lanes, that inspired J.K Rowlings Diagon Alley, walked 1000s of steps up to the Abbey and let the children spend some time shopping for souvenirs (or ice-creams). We returned back to the Chateau for an evening of dinner and a game 'Would I lie to you'.



On our final day in France, we took a trip to an amazing, world-renown, animal refuge, Refuge de l'Arche, which homes a wide variety of animals, who have suffered previous trauma/lack of care in their earlier lives (e.g. a lion cub who was found by a local resident having fallen off a circus bus when it was just 3 weeks old). After that children got to let out our inner animals on the play park before boarding the bus to a supermarche (supermarket). After returning back to the Chateau, we spent the afternoon engaging in some vigorous activities: nightline, where the children wore blackout masks and had to navigate a woodland obstacle course; fencing, sword fighting like France's famous three musketeers and some disco dancing, where we learnt the routines to some dance floor fillers. Finally, after dinner, which consisted of frog's legs and snails for starters and a dessert of gooey chocolate birthday cake (for Isaac and Max), we finished our holiday with a French catwalk, talent show and disco.



It was a fantastic trip, a wonderful experience for all pupils and staff, and as school life returns to normality after the impact of Covid, we look forward to planning more experiences, such as this, to enrich our curriculum and the lives of our pupils.

Wednesdays – Mixed Sports (for example Handball, Benchball)


Thursdays – Tennis


