

#### Year 6 Promfest


Although worn out from the excitement and thrills of the day before, Year 6 still had enough energy for a final day of fun and laughter at the Promfest.

Dessert - Dinky Doughnuts instead of Yoghurt




#### Eat Them to Defeat Them!




#### **ParentMail**

#### Transitions and new class names

We begin our transition time on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> July. Your children will have had the opportunity today, to watch a short video introduction to their new classes, teachers and class names. For the time-being, they will meet all year-group staff in the video, with specifics to who their class teacher and name is on Monday. Do look out for the videos just in case your child wishes to remind themselves of their Monday morning entry expectations.

**New Year 7s** will enter through the lower gates and head to the Year 3 classrooms which will be their main 'base' for their last weeks with us. They will be learning alongside Mr Power, Miss Waterfield, Mrs Partridge and Mrs Elvin on some exciting project-based work, including the Year 6 'Leave a Legacy' project.

We have made a decision to change class names to cities within countries for the upcoming academic year. As you may know, we do everything with purpose here at St Mary's, and the naming of classes is no different. Due to a greater international focus across the world over the last year, and in light of current events around diversity, it would be a great time to refocus the purpose of our class names. The class cities chosen therefore, cover the four main continents (as we have four year groups) and is in line with National Curriculum learning in each year group. Your child's learning of these cities and countries will then be continuously built upon over the year, alongside children making comparisons to our own major city of London, England. This will allow for greater shared international knowledge, as well as building their knowledge of 'home.'

We have asked your children to come in on Monday, with facts about the continent, countries or cities for their year group, as this will form a collaboration of shared learning between both year group classes. We are confident that this shared learning experience over time will also build for greater understanding and empathy regarding other cultures and will fall beautifully in line with our school ethos and values.

New Year 3 = Europe: Athens, Greece with Miss Waterfield and Rome, Italy with Mr Power

New Year 4 = North America: New Orleans, USA with Mr Miller and Merida, Mexico with Mrs Kirman

New Year 5 = Asia: Mumbai, India with Mrs Beuttell and Ms Laurie, and Beijing, China with Mr Hughes

**New Year 6** = Africa: Casablanca, Morocco with Mr Oxbury and Cape Town, South Africa with Mr Roberts


