


Class Learning Blog – 5 Mumbai

Look at what we have been learning this week...

This half term, Year 5 have been learning all about the Victorians and the Industrial Revolution. We have learnt about the invention of steam engines and how they were a key element in coal mining, as they pumped water out of the mines and enabled miners to dig further. We researched how steam engines helped with developing 'Stephenson's Rocket' and Beijing class made their own 'Rocket'. We have also looked at the increase in factories, child labour and pollution. The children were very interested to find out that children worked long hours and only earned 1 shilling a week - equivalent to 5p! Mumbai class have made their own replica factory and Beijing have made a model of Stephenson's 'Rocket'.









Bake Off came to Year Four!

Following our Design Technology Cookery topic, the year four children were invited to take part in a flapjack technical challenge

The technical challenge was to bake six identical pieces of flapjack.

This was the flapjack recipe they used:

Ingredients


150g galden syrup 150g demerara sugar 250g margarine 400-500g oats



Pre-heat the oven. 180 degrees centigrade.

- 1. Measure and then melt the margarine, syrup and sugar together either in the microwave or a pan.
- 2. Measure and then add in the oats. Mix together thoroughly. Add any additional ingredients.
- 3. Pour the ingredients into a baking tray and flatten the surface.
- 4. Place into the oven and bake for about 20 mins, until lightly golden.
- 5. Cut into pieces whilst warm.

They had the option of changing the sugar, syrup and margarine to suitable alternatives and adding any additional ingredients that they thought would work.





The competitors, along with their parents gathered in the school hall to watch the judging. The tension was tight as the four judges, Mrs Kirman, Miss Maher, Mrs Elvin and Mr Gracie, worked diligently to decide on a winner. Points were scored for appearance, smell, taste and texture. The scores were very close. We had four first place winners – Leela C, William R, Alice H and Thomas B. Highly commended went to – Jacob W, Bea M and Molly H.

Well done to everyone who took part, it was great to see so much enthusiasm.

The Leisure Centre is aware that children are not causing any harm, but are just concerned about their safety.







