



Class Learning Blog – 6 Casablanca

Look at what we have been learning this week...

It has been a busy but rewarding half-term so far in year 6. Our writing has been based on *The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas*, which has given us a fascinating if not sobering insight into the very real horrors of the Second World War. We are now starting to write our own alternative endings to this story and we are looking forward very much to reading how else this moving story may end.



Our recent topic has been very much linked to this story as we have looked in depth at the conflict and resolution that has been a part of global life over the last hundred years through the first and second World wars. I know that all of year 6 have been hugely engaged with this rich area of history and have learnt a great deal about the world. It has been a delight in Casablanca to hear some of the stories involving family members during the war. We have heard about evacuees and naval soldiers on special missions and it has really helped bring this topic to life. As we move forward we are looking forward to studying the science of evolution and inheritance over the next couple of weeks.

In maths, we have been investigating fractions and decimals and how to convert between the two. We will be expanding our knowledge to percentages shortly and it has been pleasing to see the children grow in confidence in a complex topic.

Our R.E lessons have seen us start to look at the concept of awe, and how this may link to God. We have also begun to study the New Year's Carol by Benjamin Britten in our music lessons.

We have also been delighted to welcome our new school councillors and learning ambassadors. Every single candidate put in a huge amount of work into preparing their speeches and they should all be very proud for putting themselves forward. Congratulations to Thea and Adele, our school councillors, and to Mia and Amy, our learning ambassadors. We look forward to seeing how they help to improve the school over the next few terms!




Yr3 Rome Library Visit

Norfolk Constabulary Internet Safety Webinars for Parents and Carers

Dear Parents / Carers,

Keeping children safe online is a huge priority for us within the Norfolk Constabulary's Youth Engagement and Safer Schools Teams. The internet is an amazing tool, however, many of the issues the Police deal with when it comes to young people involve online behaviour. The recent Ofcom "Children and parents: media use and attitudes report" (2021) found that 97% of children aged 5 - 15 watch content on video sharing platforms. Only 30% of parents use controls to restrict their children's access to inappropriate content and just over half of 12-15s have had some form of negative online experience.

One of our Safer Schools Support Workers, along with a Safer Schools Police Officer, will be running some webinars on the dates below in which we will provide advice and guidance for parents and carers about how to keep their children safe online. We will talk about the apps and websites young people are likely to be accessing and the risks they face when using these. We will highlight some of the things that parents and carers should be aware of that might indicate that their children are experiencing difficulties online and we will give advice on what to do about this and how to have conversations about internet safety. We expect the webinar will last around an hour and there will be the opportunity to ask any questions you may have about the subject.
